

**Hate Crime Definition:  
Section 422.55 of the California Penal Code**

For purposes of this title, and for purposes of all other state law unless an explicit provision of law or the context clearly requires a different meaning, the following shall apply:

- (a) "Hate crime" means a criminal act committed, in whole or in part, because of one or more of the following actual or perceived characteristics of the victim:
  - (1) Disability.
  - (2) Gender.
  - (3) Nationality.
  - (4) Race or ethnicity.
  - (5) Religion.
  - (6) Sexual orientation.
  - (7) Association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.
- (b) "Hate crime" includes, but is not limited to, a violation of Section 422.6.

**Definition of Non-Criminal Hate Violence:  
Section 67380 of the CA Education Code**

"Hate violence" means any act of physical intimidation or physical harassment, physical force or physical violence, or the threat of physical force or physical violence, that is directed against any person or group of persons, or the property of any person or group of persons because of the ethnicity, race, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, disability, or political or religious beliefs of that person or group.

2017 Total Non-Criminal Hate Violence Incidents \_\_\_\_\_

For the purposes of reporting annually all campuses need to report the number of hate crimes that occurred in the previous calendar year and ***“all occurrences of noncriminal acts of hate violence reported to, and for which a written report is prepared by, designated campus authorities”***. Also note – ***if written records are kept of non-criminal incidents the written record must include (CA Ed. Code 67380(1)(B)(2)): A description of the act of hate violence; Victim characteristics; Offender characteristics, if known.***

*Guidance Point:* If the institution does not keep any *written reports* of non-criminal acts of hate violence as the statute states as noted above than the number of non-criminal incidents that are reported should be none. If offices such as the Title IX Office, Student Affairs, or Housing keep written records of non-criminal incidents of hate violence then those records must be counted and disclosed in the total number of non-criminal acts of hate violence.
