RE: 2021/2022 Student Housing Insecurity Report

This report provides information on student housing insecurity at each of the respective California State University campuses from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022. The data in this report includes the number of students who received assistance for on-campus or off-campus housing and the average rental rates of a two-bed dorm room on campus and a two-bedroom apartment on campus.

The report has been posted to https://www.calstate.edu/legislativereports/. This report is required by Section 17203.5 of the Education Code from the Higher Education Trailer Bill of 2022 (Assembly Bill 183) which states that the CSU will provide the following:

- (a) The office of the Chancellor of the California State University and the office of the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges shall, and the office of the President of the University of California is requested to, collect data on student housing insecurity at each of their respective campuses and submit a report on that data to the Department of Finance and all relevant policy committees on or before March 1, 2023.
- (b) The collected data shall include all of the following information:
- (1) The number of students who receive housing assistance for on-campus or off-campus housing disaggregated by all of the following:

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- (A) Gender.
- (B) Ethnicity
- (C) The percentage of students who have dependents.
- (D) The percentage of students who are first-generation college students.
- (E) The percentage of students who are current or former foster youth.
- (F) The percentage of students who meet the requirements Section 68130.5.
- (G) The distribution of students by age group, income level, gender identity, and LGBTQI+ identity.
- (H) The percentage of students who are students with disabilities as identified by the campus.
- (I) The percentage of students who are current or former homeless youth.
- (J) The percentage of students who identify as LGBTQI+.
- (2) The number of students who live on campus and the number of available beds on campus.
- (3) The average rental rate for a two-bed dorm room and a two-bedroom apartment on campus.
- (4) The average rental rate for a two-bedroom apartment in city or county where the campus is located, if available.
 - (c) The requirement for submitting a report imposed under subdivision (a) is inoperative on March 1, 2027, pursuant to Section 10231.5 of the Government Code.
 - (d) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, 2028, and as of that date is repealed.

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Student Housing Insecurity Report

The 2021/2022 Student Housing Insecurity report is a requirement of the Higher Education Trailer Bill of 2022.

At the time this report was requested in the Budget Act, some of the data required for this report was not being collected, such as the student demographic data or the average rental rate for a two-bedroom apartment in the city or county where the campus is located. During academic year 2021/2022, campuses were still implementing COVID-19 restrictions for on-campus housing which impacted the number of students able to live on campus. Additionally, some campuses were utilizing federal Higher Education Emergency Relief (HEERF) funds to support students with their education and basic needs.

For the purposes of this report, housing assistance for on- and off-campus housing includes services that were made available to students from Rapid Rehousing Program and Basic Needs state funds. To obtain this information, we utilized data of unique students served under the Rapid Rehousing Program and Basic Needs funding. The disaggregated data sets requested as part of this report, were previously reported in the respective legislative reports for those funding allocations.

Defining the Rapid Rehousing (RRH) Data Elements

Eight CSU campuses participated in the Rapid Rehousing Program (RRH) in 2021/2022: Chico, Long Beach, Northridge, Pomona, Sacramento, San Diego, San Francisco, and San Jose.

Campuses engage with housing insecure students in a number of ways, and staff provide various levels of support to students depending on each individual's unique needs. Due to the various programs available to these students, we have found that not all students who are referred to the external partner agency ultimately enroll into the RRH program for several reasons. Most often, non-participation was the result of a determination made that a student may benefit from other services/programs outside of the RRH program (e.g., temporary financial assistance to pay rent). In rare instances, some students may be fully eligible to enroll into the RRH program and benefit from its services but may decline to do so for various personal reasons. Such reasons include students feeling most comfortable in their current living situation or feeling that they are not in need of this level of support. The unique situation of each student varies, but the staff at individual campuses and external



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partner agencies make every effort to ensure that students are aware of the housing resources available to them if they choose to participate.

This report includes the following data for the eight campuses enrolled in the Rapid Rehousing Program:

- Number of students searching for housing support,
- Number of students referred to an external partner agency, and
- Number of students who enrolled into the Rapid Rehousing Program

Defining the Basic Needs Data Elements

In the Budget Act of 2021, appropriations to the CSU included \$15,000,000 to sustain and expand the CSU Basic Needs Initiative. This report includes the following data for all CSU campuses:

- Unique students who have been reached and supported with oncampus emergency housing with recurring state funding,
- Unique students who have been reached and supported with offcampus emergency housing with recurring state funding,
- Unique students who have been reached and supported with emergency housing with other dollars (e.g., philanthropic support, grants).

This report reflects information from the 2021/2022 academic year. All 23 CSU's continue to identify innovative and creative ways to support students in their educational pursuits. As of academic year 2022/2023, the following programs are provided to students specifically as it relates to housing insecurity:

Housing Support

All 23 CSUs provide housing support in some form to their students. Each university has an emergency housing program to assist students with urgent housing needs. In addition to the College Focused Rapid Rehousing project, 17 CSUs have programs to support students experiencing housing insecurity with long-term housing options. These programs include offering financial assistance for

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move-in costs, rent, and utilities support. Case management support is also provided to help students locate housing. Including the universities participating in the College Focused Rapid Rehousing Program, 18 CSUs have partnered with community-based organizations to provide housing support to students. The support offered by these organizations ranges from short-term accommodations, including hotel vouchers, to longer-term solutions. Approximately 14,000 CSU students received some form of housing support, and an additional 5,037 received emergency funding.

Emergency Housing

Emergency housing is offered at all 23 CSUs with 22 universities providing oncampus emergency housing, and 16 universities providing off-campus emergency housing. Off-campus emergency housing is typically offered when on-campus emergency housing is at capacity, or when a student has circumstances that would not be appropriate for the residence halls, such as having a spouse, children and/or pets, etc. The length of stay in emergency housing ranges from 14 days to one semester, and extensions are offered based upon individual circumstances. Eleven universities also offer a residence hall meal plan to those staying in on-campus emergency housing.

Long-Term Housing Assistance

Long-term housing assistance is offered by 17 CSUs. Several of these universities offer one-time financial assistance for security deposits, rent supplements, utilities, etc. Also offered is ongoing case management support and connection to community referrals. In addition to these types of assistance, eight CSUs participate in the College Focused Rapid Rehousing program in which CSU students receive subsidized rental support and ongoing case management. This program is founded on community partnerships with local housing agencies.
